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From the Principal



The governance of Wentworth Schools by the Trust Board centres on Wentworth's "Founding Document" and associated Mission Statement. The Board, senior management and teachers continually reflect on these documents as we grow and develop the Wentworth culture. These documents are

the pillars of the school, ensuring the philosophy will endure as members of our school community and Board come and go over time. This structure gives prospective and current parents certainty of the ethos, culture and quality of education at Wentworth.

Mission Statement

"The mission of Wentworth College is to create an outstanding co-educational school where every student is educated to achieve their full potential as a whole person; to create opportunities, expand horizons, reward effort and encourage excellence in an efficient, disciplined, caring and supportive environment; to foster equity, respect, self worth, interpersonal skills and a worthwhile value system, so enabling each student to make a lifelong positive contribution to society."

As I review the term's activities it is very pleasing to confirm and reinforce that this is indeed a living document; students are fully immersed in the cocurricular and academic facets of life at school.

Students give their very best when a strong teacher/pupil relationship develops; this is certainly a feature of our school. With students' growing self confidence, they actively engage in the many opportunities that exist at Wentworth. Numerous examples are supportive of this claim throughout Term Two. The drama productions of the Sheliah Winn Shakespeare competition and the school performance of "A Mid Summer Night's Dream", the continued increase in the number of students learning a musical instrument, and the new "band class" of Years 4, 5 and 6 in the Primary school.

With the College's role of 220 students, we out-perform most schools in sport when the ratio of teams and students is considered. The latest College count of sports teams includes: 3 soccer, 3 basketball, 6 netball and 3 hockey, all playing in either the Rodney or North Harbour competition. Badminton will also join this group next term. We have students involved in two combined schools' rugby teams, playing in the 6th grade and the North Harbour First 15 Grade. Wentworth students make up almost all of the

"forward pack" in this team that plays in First 15 competition. Other sporting activities this term where students have represented the school include orienteering, pentathlon and fencing.

Two very recent outstanding College sports results include Rawiri Geddes, a Year 12 student, who finished third in the New Zealand Trust Youth Sailing Regatta. Rawiri, sailing a Laser Radial finished behind the 2008 World Champion and the 2009 New Zealand Champion. This regatta is the final build up to the World Championships in Brazil. The second result saw a dynamic tussle by Wentworth's senior netball team playing in the final of the Rodney secondary schools championship. Playing against competition favourites, Otamatea High School, Wentworth played superbly but was finally beaten in the dying minutes of the game 37-35. These results demonstrate a wonderful effort by both Rawiri and senior netball team.

Overlaying this co-curricular involvement is the academic achievement and development of our students. High academic standards where students achieve to their best ability are of vital importance to our students, teachers, and the entire school community. The excellent NCEA results from last year are significantly ahead of the national average. Recent national figures giving the NCEA Level 3 pass rates for girls 63% and boys 43% is of concern, especially for boy's education. Wentworth's pass rate at NCEA in 2008 was Level 1 – 95 %, Level 2 - 97.6 % and Level 3 - 85 % indicating we cater exceptionally well for all students learning needs, providing an environment where both boys and girls can perform and achieve to their very best ability.

It is important for the Board, teachers, students and parents that we continue to market and grow our school roll. The support and feedback we receive is superb and I wish to express my appreciation of the commitment that our community gives to Wentworth. In a recent article in the Herald on Sunday, which discusses the advantages of private schooling for children, one parent asks "Can you put a price on your child's happiness and eagerness to learn?"

Throughout Term 3 the Board will be communicating with parents at specific evenings, seeking feedback on the development of our strategic vision for the next three years. The evenings will discuss financial planning, resourcing, branding, marketing and curriculum development of the school. The Board looks forward to sharing, discussing and receiving feedback from parents at these meetings.

The new site gives us greater opportunities to

interact with our Wentworth community in an electronic sense. E-newsletters, news messages, Bulletins, term dates and the school calendar are just some of the functions we will be publishing on our web site. I believe we even have "twitter" capability!

We look forward to your feedback and suggestions over Term 3.

Term 3 requires students to reassess their academic year and make the necessary adjustments to ensure success at the end of the school year. Parent/teacher interviews will be held early in the term. I encourage parents and students to attend this important evening. All teachers are contactable by email and welcome your communications.



This was against representative squads from Wellington and Hawkes Bay. Absolutely freezing conditions made Days 1 and 2 miserable. Standout performances came from Chelsea Pratt with two 2nd places and a 5th, and from Lizzie Morse who gained a 6th place. All competed extremely well against the best school orienteering students in the North Island, many of whom are representing NZ and have been competing for the last 8 - 10 years.


