The cognitive demands of the Cambridge International Examination system have indeed raised the effort and motivation of all senior students. 2011 Head Girl, Julia Tillett, visited recently during the Otago University holidays. She commented on how amazingly well prepared she was for university having studied under the Cambridge system.

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"We are way ahead of students that did not study CIE; we are used to deadlines, we know how to study and are comfortable with exams."

Alongside our high academic expectations of our students is the importance we place on student involvement in cocurricular activities such as sport, music, drama and the outdoor education programme. This is an integral component of school life at Wentworth. We aim to demonstrate to our students that developing skills in many areas enhances the quality of their lives. Young people respond well to this range of challenges and in all activities, both within and outside the classroom, we expect and see in our students a high level of personal conduct, uniform presentation and behaviour. We are as proud of our students as they are of their school.

As I review Term 2 activities and reflect on the 2011 Cambridge examination results and the recent mid-year examinations, it is pleasing to confirm that these founding documents are indeed working. Our students are fully immersed in the academic and co-curricular facets of Wentworth.

A recent school analysis indicated that over 70% of our student body are representing Wentworth College in a sport. This is an outstanding statistic when the average number of students involved in sports across New Zealand State Schools is only 52%. On top of this operates a comprehensive and competitive inter-House sports competition that promises more exhilarating activities at lunchtime this term with Volleyball and Badminton matches planned for the next few weeks.

Our students make the most of their time on campus and I am especially pleased to acknowledge the problem we recently encountered, of ensuring that the growing number of clubs and activities that occur at lunchtime and after school did not overlap. These clubs include Debating, Drama, Spanish, Maths, Chess, Art, Homework and Science Clubs. Activities such as Orchestra, Choir, the Duke of Edinburgh programme, the Adventure Club and also our wide range of sports, offer our students and parents the chance to participate in education outside the classroom.

Wentworth College is a school that has established some very fine traditions in both the classroom and co-curricular areas. I am pleased to see that the students who are currently enrolled and

studying here are making the most of the wide range of opportunities offered to them.

MID-YEAR EXAMINATIONS

For IGCSE, AS and A2 classes the mid-year examinations mark the half-way point to their formal Cambridge finals. It is a chance for teachers and students to check progress and determine what may need to be done to ensure everything is on track. For the junior students the examinations are a vital experience in preparing for and sitting formal tests and also an opportunity to check what has been learned throughout the semester. Cambridge examinations vary in length from one hour to three hours, depending on the components within a subject. The school examinations often reflect this. AS Science students are also required to sit practical examinations.





























Fencing

The final for Auckland Secondary School Fencing Championships was held during the term. The Secondary Schools Competition was made up of several competitions where different schools fenced against each other. It was attended by Saint Kentigern College, Massey High School, Epsom Girls' Grammar School and Auckland Grammar School, to name a few. Wentworth's Natalie Dunn won Gold in the Women's Foil, while both Jurgens van Zyl and Joe Pearson made it into the final 8 for Men's Foil.

Jurgens also attended the Australian Under 17 Championships in Sydney in the first week of the holidays. He fenced with foil and epee in both individual and team events. His best results were 6th place in epee and his team won a silver medal. The competition was very well attended by about 80 fencers from Australia, New Zealand and Singapore.

AS Economics/Business Wellington Trip

In the final week of term the Year 12 Economics and Business students travelled to Wellington to take their studies outside the classroom for a few days.

After arriving in Wellington the group went to the Weta Cave where they were shown a DVD about the growth of Weta from its humble beginnings to its present position as a world leader in movie production and special effects. After the DVD, students were able to view various props and models in the museum including Gollum from the Lord of the Rings trilogy.

Economics students visited the Reserve Bank of New Zealand (RBNZ) where they were given a presentation about the role of the RBNZ and then a tour of the museum featuring many interesting exhibits including:

- One million dollars worth of \$50 notes
- · Samples of early currency in New Zealand
- Some counterfeit notes
- An impregnable safe door
- An interesting machine invented by famous NZ Economist Bill Philips' simulating the flow of money around an economy (using water).

After the tour the students were taken to the dealing room where they could see RBNZ currency traders trading various currencies around the world.

The economists also visited Treasury. Treasury give advice to the government on how to control its finances. They give information to the government on important policy issues such as tax changes and the partial sale of government assets. Students were given a task where they were allocated \$500m of government funds and then had to justify where they would allocate this money.

Our Business students were given a tour of Westpac Stadium from a business perspective. Among other things, they were informed about the cost of the stadium, how it was funded, and the revenue it earns from various games, concerts and hospitality events.

Business students also visited the Supreme Court of New Zealand. They were impressed by the ultra-modern new building with its high tech acoustics and electronics systems. They had a tour of the old High Court building which was very dark and foreboding in comparison, especially down in the holding cells which still have obscene graffiti on their walls.

All students came together for a parliamentary tour. The tour guide gave a lecture on how the parliamentary system works, then it was off to observe the House in session. The students enjoyed watching the action in the debating chamber and commented that some of the behaviour was far worse than they would see in a school. Later, the Speaker of the House, Dr Lockwood Smith, entertained our group in the Speaker's Lounge which has hosted dignitaries such as Hillary Clinton and the King and Queen of Spain.

The trip was informative, educational and enjoyable and, best of all, enabled the students to see some real life examples of what they learn in class.


