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#### From the Principal



"What are the main advantages of Wentworth College over other secondary school options?" is a question I am asked frequently. I enjoy answering this

question as I am passionate about education and the opportunities we are offering at Wentworth.

Over and above all other factors that lead to optimum teaching and learning, are the positive relationships that students develop with their teachers. As our students move through their school years, teachers develop a comprehensive understanding of student strengths, weaknesses and personality. The great advantage of this is that a teaching plan can be developed for each child and we can closely monitor progress and achievement. In many large schools, students often drift through their schooling not really being noticed and individual needs are not catered for or met. "There are no places to hide at Wentworth." We know all students and we aim to provide the best for every child. If concerns occur, we can quickly assist and address issues, working with students, parents and teachers to gain a positive outcome. Expectation of achievement, behaviour and standards are clearly articulated and enforced.

We celebrate competition, success and participation in all areas of educational life, from the classroom, sports field, drama and music performances to outdoor pursuit achievements. Each week in our weekly e-newsletters we highlight these successes and celebrate student's achievement in school assemblies. Students are encouraged to try new activities; they are often personally approached by teachers to join an activity or are swept along and enrolled through friends' enthusiasm and encouragement. Student participation in school wide activities is exceptionally high. A very positive flow-on effect from this

involvement in school life is the development of strength of character and confidence. ERO, in their last two reviews (2006, 2009), have commented on how "confident" Wentworth students are, and that Wentworth is to be congratulated on this as it demonstrates students are successful, happy and "thrive in this environment of mutual respect and support."

The best parts of my day are my classroom teaching and walking around the school at morning tea and lunchtimes. Chatting with students, commenting on individual interest, achievements, sport performance, school work and issues, helps me to develop a "feel" for school tone and student engagement. Often a gentle reminder of expectation is all that is required to help assist student focus and achievement.

Children inherently want to please, especially if there exists strong teacher/pupil relationships and they believe that teachers are genuinely interested in them. The outcome is that students develop a strong sense of belonging and belief in their school.

This Bulletin features Wentworth students fully involved in just a sample of the numerous school activities that took place throughout a very eventful term. It reflects favourably on the engagement of the students in an environment where teachers and parents work towards creating the best possible educational climate, fostering exploration and personal challenge.

#### For the Love of Three Oranges



### **International Sporting Success**

Matthew Hughes represented New Zealand at the Asian Optimist Champs in Pattaya, Thailand. Overall he finished 42nd out of 103 sailors and in teams racing New Zealand finished 7th out of 16 teams.

Gideon van Zyl and Jazmin Hopper participated in the North Island Open Fencing Championships in June. Both won bronze medals in the Foil event. Both Gideon and Jazmin as well as Stephanie Wyllie will attend the Oceania Junior Championships held in Christchurch over the winter holidays.

Jurgens van Zyl participated in the Australian Fencing Championships in July. He won a silver medal in the Under 15 Individual Epee event, against an athlete ranked third in the world for under 17 Epee. Jurgens was captain of the Under 15 Foil B-team for New Zealand and his team won a bronze. Jurgens will also attend the Oceania Junior Championships.

Congratulations to Rawiri Geddes who was selected to join the NZ Lasers Standard youth team to sail in the World Laser Regatta in Haling Island, England, in early September. Rawiri has also won a sailing scholarship to the Royal NZ Yacht Squadron to train for 12 months in Match Racing (America Cup is match racing) starting May 1st. He is the youngest candidate selected.


## Senior Geography
