# WENTWORTH COLLEGE BULLET TIN ISSUE 12 May 2009

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#### From the Principal



Year 11 students commenced the Cambridge IGCSE (International General Certificate of Secondary Education) syllabus in June 2008 and are now fully immersed and well through their course of study. Most students will

be sitting their examinations in October and November, with the exception of Drama and Music students who will be examined in June. It is interesting to see the renewed focus that students at Year 11 are having with the Cambridge qualification compared to NCEA assessments. The accumulation of credits through internal assessment and reassessment for NCEA can create a relaxed attitude from students towards their school work. The urgency of Cambridge examinations certainly sharpens students' work output throughout the year.

There is no one educational curriculum and assessment process that fits all students. At Wentworth we are developing the Cambridge framework but elements of NCEA will be attached for some students in Year 12 from 2010. I believe this gives our students the very best opportunity to succeed academically, ensuring individuals reach their potential. At Wentworth we aim to create an educational environment where individual progress and achievements are optimised through close attention to students' needs. As students move through the school, teachers develop an excellent understanding of their educational requirements, identifying strengths and weaknesses. Many hours are spent working with individual students, tracking progress, reinforcing expectations, giving academic assistance and catering for remedial or extension needs. Historically the academic results achieved by our students in NCEA Levels 1, 2 and 3 support this claim. The 2008 pass rate results are Level 1-95%, Level 2- 91% and Level 3- 85%. Cambridge Maths at Year 11 IGCSE pass rate was 100%.

I am impressed with the preparation undertaken by our Drama students in scheduling a very full programme of performances throughout Term 2. Wentworth has a number of short performances in the annual Sheilah Winn Shakespeare festival, where secondary schools throughout the North Shore and Rodney compete. This is followed closely by our main production of Shakespeare's "A Mid Summer Night's Dream" scheduled for May 19th and 20th. Wentworth students are also enthusiastically rehearsing for our inaugural entry into the secondary schools' "Stage Challenge" competition which incorporates music, lighting, dance and drama. Further information concerning all these events will be published in our weekly e-newsletter.

I recently previewed the Winter Sports Programme, comprised to date of 4 soccer teams, 3 hockey teams, 6 netball teams, 3 basketball teams and a rugby team. For a school of just over 200, our students are fully engaged and proudly represent their school. Few schools could match Wentworth's students' involvement in co-curricular activities for its roll size. The contribution from the teaching faculty and, just as importantly, from parents is the foundation that ensures our students have these opportunities. As you read this Bulletin I hope you gauge a sense of the fullness of Wentworth school life.

The relationship between school work, cocurricular activities and the cohesive family atmosphere we foster at Wentworth creates confident young adults who enthusiastically contribute to school life. This confidence is also often reflected outside of the school environment. We certainly have a positive challenge, trying to report weekly on the many successes of Wentworth students competing at individual or club level in a range of activities outside the school.

Being an all-round school means truly educating a child for life and developing their 'intelligences' in the broadest way, preparing them to be successful and leaders for life based on the values, experiences and education Wentworth has given them.

I am sure you will enjoy reading this Bulletin: we certainly encourage feedback and welcome suggestions. I am also available for interview through contacting Gail Clews in the school office.


