
BULLETIN

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The Education Review Office conducted their three yearly audit of Wentworth College during Term 3. This comprehensive review examined all aspects of teaching, the quality of student learning, school culture and student welfare, the effectiveness of the school operation, as well as the many

compliance requirements expected of private schools. The review process involved lengthy interviews with the senior management, interviews with students from all Year levels, a walk through the school watching and discussing teaching and learning with teachers, and an analysis of school documentation.

ERO reports are of particular importance for the Board, parents and teachers. They provide an independent report card for the school.

I am pleased to confirm that the Review Officers were very impressed with the culture and operation of Wentworth College. The final review document has now been published and is available for viewing on the school website.

"Teachers encourage positive interactions with students and between students." The reviewers stated that the school is true to its philosophy and values, shows excellence in academic achievement, has an extensive range and high level of performance in co-curricular activities, and a strong school tone and culture reflecting values and high standards. The school has a "culture of success" and "the social and emotional wellbeing of the students is very well supported by a pastoral care system that reflects the school's commitment to values of respect for self and for others. By working together as a community students develop a sense of empathy, personal responsibility and resilience ...". The College has become increasingly "future-focussed" and the ERO reviewers made special comment that the "students are able to personalise their course of study to meet their aspirations regarding future study and career choices." They also noted that the staffing levels are "generous, with small classes ensuring students receive individual teaching."





Wentworth College met all Ministry requirements and there were no areas that necessitated development or improvement.

The Board is very pleased with the continuity of results and comments from ERO reporting since the school's inception (2003, 2006, 2009, 2012 and 2016) as each one articulates that Wentworth College is a very high performing school where quality teaching and learning occurs

Terms 3 and 4 are traditionally the time when parents consider where their children will go for schooling in the following year. I encourage you to share some of the Review Officers' encouraging feedback with your friends, neighbours, work colleagues and family. As the Officers make clear, Wentworth has much to offer and parents who invest in their children by enrolling them at Wentworth can be assured that the school will provide a positive climate where their child will be supported towards achieving his or her very best.

We frequently receive letters and words of thanks from parents saying that placing their child in Wentworth was the best decision they could have made. One parent recently commented... "Wentworth provided a wonderful education for my son, and equally important was that the school fostered standards, resilience and strength of character, essential life skills thanks Wentworth."

Senior school students have been sitting their Cambridge examinations throughout Term 4. The students were well prepared in the content of their courses as well as in how to achieve success in their papers. We look forward to hearing of their successes when the results are released in January.


SCHOOL PRODUCTION - "ROBINA HOOD"




Tree Adventures

During Term 3, Marine Studies' students worked on their Marine VHF Operator Certificate which is heavily theory based. To put this theory into context, they were invited by the local Coastguard team onto "Hib 1"; the rigid inflatable boat (RIB) operating from the Gulf Harbour Marina. The premium position of Wentworth's location in the Hauraki Gulf enables us to take advantage of outstanding learning opportunities on our doorstep.

After leaving Wentworth I spent a few years studying Computer Science at the University of Auckland, before joining the Royal New Zealand Air Force in January 2015 as an Air Warfare Specialist. As an Air Warfare Specialist it is my responsibility to operate the sophisticated sensors on board the P-3K2 Orion Maritime Patrol Aircraft. At 5 Squadron I routinely participate in Search and Rescue, Fisheries Protection and Anti-Submarine exercises.
