"Our students are thinking of the bigger picture – they want to be part of the global world and the Cambridge examinations set them up for future success on an international level," Principal Bruce Tong says.

Despite its astounding academic record, the school retains a down-to-earth philosophy and stays true to its mission of creating opportunities, expanding horizons, rewarding effort and encouraging excellence in all aspects of life.

"We are a private school where ordinary, everyday kids work to be the best they can be - becoming extraordinary young people in the process," Deputy Principal Philip Lee says.

Outside the classroom there are plenty of activities and events that encourage students to continue their personal growth, including 23 sports ranging from basketball and netball through to sailing, rowing and pistol shooting.

The school is easily accessible thanks to its bus service from Matakana, Kaukapakapa, Coatesville and the North Shore, and enrolments are open all year round.

International Student Success at Wentworth

Earlier in the year we were also visited by a television crew from Education New Zealand who were making a series of short videos, showcasing the benefits of a New Zealand education to students from overseas. Our 2013 Wentworth College Dux, and captain of the Wentworth Golf Team, Jerry Ren, was the subject of one of these videos. "My name is Jerry Ren and during 2013 I was a senior student at Wentworth College. I joined Wentworth at the same time

that I moved over from China about 5 years ago. I was quite nervous when I first got here due to the unfamiliar environment and language difficulties. Luckily Wentworth is a very friendly and welcoming school and soon it became my second home and also the most memorable place in my life. During my years at Wentworth I saw a huge improvement in my language skills and other academic knowledge. The teachers at Wentworth are very professional and responsible. They not only helped me gain good examination results but we also built very close personal relationships, which made school life exciting and enjoyable.



Students at Wentworth can follow the Cambridge examination system and take IGCSE or A-level examinations. This is a real benefit because Cambridge is recognised across the world, which gives us many more options for future study and career choices.

One of the reasons I joined Wentworth is their Golf Academy, where students are able to play on the amazing Gulf Harbour Country Club course. This course is one of the top 10 golf courses in New Zealand.

Being a member of the Wentworth Golf Academy has certainly helped me a lot with taking my game to the next level. I have made many friends and it is not an exaggeration to say that the years in Wentworth have set an excellent

foundation for the rest of my life."
